
Dusty Brandel 1934 - 2022

We are sad to report Dusty Brandel has passed away. Dusty was always an enthusiastic supporter of Fabulous Fifties' events and gatherings and will be greatly missed. Norma Lee "Dusty" Brandel was born in Los Angeles on September 29, 1934. She began her motorsports journalism career in 1955 working for the Hollywood *Citizen News* covering various Southern California sports car races. A copy of the article where she covered the Grand Central Airport race in Glendale, California is included below.

1963 was Dusty's first year reporting from the Indianapolis 500, but women weren't allowed in the garages or press rooms at certain racetracks at that




In 1972 Brandel received the first NASCAR press credential assigned to a female at Ontario Motor Speedway's *Miller High Life 500* NASCAR race in California where she reported live from the Speedway garages. When Fontana's California Speedway opened in 1997, Dusty was there to report on the action.

In 2001, Dusty received the American Auto Racing Writers & Broadcasters Association (AARWBA) Angelo Angelopolous Award. She eventually became the president and executive director of the 400-plus member organization.

In 2018 Brandel was honored at the NASCAR Hall of Fame induction ceremony in Charlotte, North Carolina as the recipient of the Squier-Hall Award (named after NASCAR broadcasters Ken Squier and Barney Hall). Brandel was also a board member of the West Coast Stock Car Hall of Fame.
